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Summary:

During a second phone call on the same day, Bush and Kohl quickly discuss Germany's financial contributions to the Gulf War.

MEMORANDUM OF TELEPHONE CONVERSATION

SUBJECT: Telcon with Chancellor Kohl of Germany (U)

PARTICIPANTS: The President Helmut Kohl, Chancellor Notetaker: Robert Hutchings, NSC Staff Interpreter: Gisela Marcuse

DATE, TIME January 28, 1991, 11:50 - 11:57 a.m. AND PLACE: The Oval Office

The President initiated the call. (U)

The President: Helmut, I am back again. The 6 billion dollars was our original proposal. It includes a new 5 billion for operations and 1 billion on the track before for Desert Shield, before hostilities broke out. The 6 billion would put German participation to just over 10%. 5 billion would put it at just under 10%. I think from the perception of the public -- which we will join you in fighting, whatever you decide -- it would be better if you committed 6 billion. There might be a compromise; 5 1/2 billion would be exactly 10 percent. But whatever you do will be fine with me. We will welcome your contribution and express our gratitude. I will tell you that Congress, in its infinite wisdom, would react better to 6 than 5, but I don't want to get into a rug auction like in Baghdad. I hope it will be 6 but if it can't be, we will understand and put the best possible face on it. (§)

<u>Chancellor Kohl</u>: If 5 1/2 billion would be exactly 10 percent, then we will make it 5 1/2 and the rest will go to London. (\mathbf{f})

<u>The President</u>: Let's do that. I am grateful to you. $(\not L)$

<u>Chancellor Kohl</u>: London would be almost another billion dollars. (β)

<u>The President</u>: We will point that out, too. It is very generous. $(\not L)$

<u>Chancellor Kohl</u>: I would like to ask you not to tell the public the exact amount for London. You could say 5 1/2 billion and also a contribution for London. (Z)

<u>The President</u>: We could say 5 1/2 and be silent on London or whatever you prefer. (\not)

<u>Chancellor Kohl</u>: It would be better for tomorrow to say that we have agreed on 5 1/2 billion, and if asked you could say that we will also support London. (\mathscr{D})

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<u>The President</u>: Let me be clear. It is okay to say today or tomorrow that Germany has agreed to 5 1/2 billion dollars. ($\not c$)

<u>Chancellor Kohl</u>: Tomorrow, please, because it is already evening here. (\mathcal{Q})

<u>The President</u>: We will be silent today and wait until your announcement and then follow up with gratitude. (\mathcal{Q})

<u>Chancellor Kohl</u>: That makes the thing definite from my side. (\mathcal{Q})

The President: Okay. Thanks very much. (U)
