In Holland and Belgium the Governments continue to await the outcome of the negotiations before making any final

decision.

Time to Stop Cruise

Two years ago a series of demonstrations across Europe pushed the nuclear issue to the forefront of the political agenda. Since the German and British elections there has been some complacency in NATO circles. The protests had been worrying, but the worst was now over. With Kohl and Thatcher in command, the way was open for deployment.

Throughout the European peace movement there is a spirit of excitement and hope. Despite the electoral setbacks resistance to the missiles has never been more widespread or more determined.

There is still time to reverse the arms race. What happens at Geneva will depend to a significant extent, on what happens on the streets and at the bases in October:

The Rally

The scale of our protest in London will be very visible. Despite initial opposition from the police there will now be two marches setting off from the Victoria Embankment. These will pass through the major political centres of London, as well as crossing over each other and the Thames. We will fill the streets around Parliament and the Ministry of Defence. We will fill the river banks, north and south. We will fill Waterloo and Westminster bridges. Everywhere there will be banners, colour, children, women, men-people coming together in their tens of thousands to stop the bomb.

At the assembly point and along the routes there will be stages for music and entertainment; we are hoping to cater for (nearly) every taste! There will be giant puppets, steel bands, a four mile dragon, marching bands-and all the magnificent displays that local groups and supporters bring with them. Ex-services CND will have a prominent position in the rally.

Hence, the assembly and march itself are going to be just as much a focus for the day as the final rally and we are investigating further possibilities for highlighting this idea of a 'street rally' in the centre of London.

For the final rally we will be again using Hyde Park. After much discussion and negotiation this has proved to be the only place in the circumstances that can accommodate safely the numbers that we are hoping will take part.

The key to making October 22 a success is mobilisation. We are going to have to pull out all the stops to make sure that every supporter or potential supporter is in London on that date. Below we report on our progress at both national and local levels.

LOCAL

Here's a small selection of the 22 October items in local group/regional/area newsletters now reaching us. We include a longer piece from an especially interesting effort being put in by Hackney CND.

The East London borough of Hackney, now famous as an example of urban decay, also boasts a large and active CND group, and we are pulling out all the stops to ensure that Hackney's contribution to the October 22 demonstration is the biggest ever. In the hope that some of the campaigning ideas we have come up with will be of use to other groups here's what we've been doing.

Since the beginning of August an 'October 22 planning group' has been discussing and putting into action ways of publicising the demonstration. So far we have:

Sent letters (with leaflets attached) to all trade unions, political parties, and community groups in the borough, urging them to support the demo and donate some money for publicity, and offering to send a speaker to one of their meetings;

Booked a full-page advert in our local paper in the week prior to October 22. This will be paid for by donations from organisations who support us and HCND members (who have been asked to give up a day's pay);

Produced a special 'Demo issue' of our Newsletter in October, carrying the A3 Where will you be? poster for window display.

Booked the 60-second October 22 film into our local commercial cinema (this will cost us about £30 for a week; Hackney's in-dependent cinema is taking it free);

Placed an article in the October issue of the Hackney Pensioner's Press urging OAPs to

go on the demo; Taken an initial 1,000 posters and 10,000 leaflets for door-to-door distribution:

In addition to all this we have approached Hackney Council, who have a strong anti-nuclear policy. At a meeting with the secretaries of HCND the leader of the council

To fly the CND flag from Hackney's three town halls for the week prior to October 22; To donate up to £200 towards the cost of the

advert in the local paper;

To display October 22 posters on council hoardings and in the libraries. We are also discussing lamp-post banners with the council's publicity officer.

Lastly, to help finance our publicity - and reward ourselves for all the hard work - we are organising, in conjunction with East London Co-operative Retail Society, an eve-ofdemonstration benefit, with the Fallout Theatre performing their 'Galaxy's Guide to Survival

Already there's a buzz going round about October 22. All the signs are that it's going to be a whopper. But let's not leave anything to chance!





A leaflet designed for distribution to Trade Unionists will be available in mid September. These will be more expensive than the ordinary leaflets, probably at \$4 per 1000.





THETHOT AUTUMN

October 22 to 29 will be United Nations Disarmament Week. As in 1981, the scale of co-ordinated international protest to new escalations in the nuclear arms race will be truly significant especially in those countries effected by the deployment of cruise and Pershing II missiles. Below we list some of the actions which we know about at the time of writing.

Irish CND are planning demonstration in Dublin on Oct. 22.

BRITAIN

Major national CND rally on October 22 in London.

CANADA

There will be at least 15 peace actions on 22 October spread right across Canada from Vancouver to Montreal and Toronto. The Canadian peace movement aims to make Canada a truly nuclear free state: in Canada it is not just the cruise missile which is being tested, but the independence of Canada vis-a-vis the United States.

USA: Support for Europe all over USA The Freeze Campaign and dozens of other peace organisations are endorsing the week of October 15 to 22 as a week of demonstrations on 'EUROMISSILES' to coincide with the European actions. The events will be all over the USA and are being organised by a wide range of groups. The aim is a firm expression of

solidarity with the five countries expecting cruise and Pershing II and with the whole European peace movement. The event will be aimed at the manufacturers, testing sites and US bases and at stopping the deployment of cruise and Pershing II at source.

There will be a mixture of demonstrations, non-violent actions, blockades and civil dis-

The kick-off demonstration is in Philadelphia on 6 October and marks the visit to Germantown of Chancellor Kohl of West Germany. On 15 October there will be a 'Link to end the Arms Race' encirclement of Rocky Flats in Colorado. The Livermore Action Group reports the foundation of a coalition group in the San Francisco Bay area which is planning a whole weekend of events including a mass trespass into the companies which have contracts for cruise and Pershing II in Silicon Valley.

On October 22 there will be a statewide march in Austin, Texas; a statewide demonstration at the Martin Marietta Plant in Orlando, Florida and a march and rally in San Fransisco. There will be NVDA at the Convair plant in San Diego, California, where cruise and Pershing II are expected to be deployed and in Chicago and Burlington, Vermont. There will be other events in Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Indiana, Lousiana, Maryland, Massachussetts, Michigan, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oregon, Rhode Island and Washington. HOLLAND

The NETHERLANDS - 'Cruise missiles No" on 29 October, round the Dutch Parliament and other buildings in the Hague, there will be a demonstration organised by a broad coalition, including the peace organisations, Stop the neutron bomb, Women for peace, and IKV, the soldiers' union VVDM and the largest Dutch trades union. The event starts at noon and at a certain moment there will be a huge ring of NORWAY

The main Norwegian peace group Nei til Atomyapaen is planning an Action Week from Soviet and US embassies. 17 to 24 October. There will be events in the major cities in Norway, culminating in a torchlit march in Oslo. Before and during the week, a campaign newspaper (300,000 copies) will be distributed round the country.

DENMARK

During the week of 22 to 29 October there will be a series of conferences on 'New ways to Disarmament'. On 29 October a large demo is planned in Copenhagen, arranged by No to Nuclear Weapons, the National Campaign against the missiles, and Trades Unions for

Leading up to the demonstration in Brussels on 23 October there will be a peace week - 17-25 September with exhibitions, information evenings and a door-to-door petition campaign.

WEST GERMANY

A 'Hot Autumn' of civil disobedience against cruise and Pershing II, the SS20 and militarisation. An action week is planned from 15 to 22 October culminating in demonstrations in Bonn, Hamburg, Stuttgart, Neu Ulm and


The action week will see events like the encirclement and non-violent blockade of the military harbour in Bremerhaven - to which Pershing I has been shipped. There will be a religious day on the 16th, with processions, services, fasting and bell-ringing near the military sites. The 17th is set aside for women's actions including chains between the US and Soviet embassies, vigils in front of the French and British consulates and the conversion of street signs from military to peaceful names. The 19th will be trades union day with a Pershing II flying time strike (5-7 minutes). The 20th is set aside for schools and universities, the 21st for parliamentarians and the 22nd for demonstrations.

The co-ordinating group expect a million Germans will be participating in the 'Hot Autumn'.

SWITZERLAND

October 15 to 22 will be a peace week. On 5 November an all Swiss rally and a human chain surrounding the Swiss seat of government and the US and Soviet embassies.

The peace camp at Comiso is planning a blockade at the base which will start at the end of September and on October 22nd there will be demonstrations in Rome and probably in



FRANCE

On October 22 there will be a rally on the themes of 'Peace and Disarmament' and 'Negotiations East and West' organised by Mouvement de la Paix.

On 23 October a human chain will link the US and Soviet embassies. The themes will be No cruise and Pershing II, Dismantle SS4s, SS5s and SS20s aimed at Europe, No to the Force de Frappe and for a dialogue with the independent East European peace groups. This is organised by CODENE.

PORTUGAL


October 30. Mass demonstrations in Lisbon and other cities and towns.

SPAIN

Actions and events to express solidarity with the peace movements in the deployment countries. Co-ordinated campaigns right through from the beginning of October to the 23rd when there will be demonstrations in all the major cities. Emphasis on opposition to NATO.

END Five Nations Meetings

AUTUMN 1983 is the time when the first of the cruise missiles are due to be brought to Greenham Common. As well as signalling yet another murderous and unnecessary step in the nuclear arms race, cruise and Pershing II missiles will greatly add to the already overwhelming difficulties of achieving negotiated arms reductions between the superpowers. In the continuing movement for nuclear



disarmament, it is particularly important to build the opposition to these new missiles due to be deployed in Europe.

In Britain, we can gain strength from an awareness of our close links with the parallel campaigns which are gathering momentum in the other European countries most directly affected.

EUROPEAN NUCLEAR DIS-ARMAMENT has taken the initiative by inviting speakers from the Netherlands. Belgium, West Germany and Italy to come and describe their campaigns, to discuss strategies for bringing abut the final refusal or removal of these missiles, and to express a sense of united European opposition to this expansion of the nuclear arsenals on our continent.

The speakers will tour the country with representatives of the British peace movement, addressing public meetings and talking to the press and local media.

The tour will help to create a greater awareness of the threat these missiles pose to people throughout Europe, and it will serve as one means of mobilising participation in the CND DEMONSTRA-TION ON OCTOBER 22.
