

March 5, 1957 State Department and CIA Officials Discuss Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberation

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Summary:

Robert Murphy, Allen Dulles, and other officials review on March 2 State Department recommendations contained in a memorandum dated January 10 [document not released] and agree that the charter of the Committee on Radio Broadcasting Policy (CRBP) include drafting Radio Free Europe (RFE) country policy guidances and considering reductions in RFE broadcasts

- 1. It was agreed that the problems raised in above reference were of sufficient scope and complexity to require the formation of a joint State. GIA and USIA Special Committee within the terms of the OGB mechanism. Mr. E. Alian Lightner, Jr. of State was accepted as Chairman, and Mr. Reame as the other State mamber. For CIA it was agreed that Mr. FitsGerald and Mr. Meyer would be the Agency's two representatives. Mr. Button was agreed to as one of the USIA representatives and State undertook to discuss with USIA the memination of a second representative to replace Mr. Barding who had previously been suggested, but who is now unavailable. State accepted the responsibility of calling the Committee tegether.
- A. Regarding the issue of budgetary priorities as raised in Recommendation No. 1 of reference, Mr. Delice pointed out that there were no present plans for the physical expansion of RFE

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facilities and that, therefore, in FY '58 there was no badgetary priority problem affecting RFE. It was noted that a sharp deterioration of RFE's position in Germany might require the expension of programming facilities in Landon and this issue would have to be faced when and if it arase.

- India Liberation's negatistions with the Spanish Government for a base many Exections was rehearsed. It was made clear that the Department of Sinte had previously approved this negatisting effort, that the Durent of the Budget had exempted finds from the Agency's receive for this project and that Radio Liberation was in mend of argent advice as to whether to sign an acceptable contract for the initial installation of a 100-lest transmitter in Spain. Air. Marphy said that the Bureau of the Budget had recently questioned him as to whether the Sinte Bepartment would still grant policy approval to such an expansion. Mr. Marphy stated that he had not given a yes or so answer to the Bureau and he agreed that this issue should be pinced before the Special Governittes defined above for immediate resolution.
- 4. As establed discussion took place regarding Recommendation No. 3 of reference. Mr. Murphy said that the recent Hungarian Revolution and the reaction of the Hungarian refugees had raised sarious doubts in the Department as to the advisability of continuing RFE as a breadensting effort to the Satellitor, as distinct from VOA. He indicated that communications from a number of Amberradors in the Sziellite area had re-enforced these doubts and that exother contributing factor was the poll recently conducted among Hungarina refunece by two Fereign Service Officers especially assigned to this task. hir. Duller indicated that he had seen no conclusive and convincing evidence that there was a present used for reducing the RFE broadcasts to office Mangary or Poland or the other Satellitor. Reference was made by Mr. Moyer to the extensive scientific poil conducted by the International Research Associates among Happarian referees, to the statement calling for the continuing of RFE made by the Hungarian Revolutionary Council and to the number of indications from within Poland that RFE was playing an affective and responsible role in Polish afforts to secure a degree of independence from the Seviets. The State representatives agreed that the situation in Hungary had changed





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aince the time reference was drafted in December, and that no reduction of RFE broadcasting to Mungary was advisable at this time, but they did feel that the delicate attention in Paland did require reconsideration. It was agreed that the considerable body of remember conflicting evidence available on RFE broadcasting be reviewed by the Special Committee, with the request that it came up with recommendations so to what if any reduction seemed advisable.

- 5. Regarding Recommendation No. 4 of reference, it was agreed that the State Department should continue to preced with its preparation of the eventry guidance papers for each of the five Satellites. These would be considered jointly by State and GIA and then submitted to the Special Committee for final review.
- 6. Regarding Recommendation No. 3 of reference, it was faily agreed that both RFE and Radio Liberation should continue to conform in their output to U. 5. policy guidance. It was agreed that RFE's Polich Dock had demonstrated admirable discipline and self-restraint in fallowing policy under difficult and confesing elecumetaness, and it was pointed out by the GIA representatives that policy controls had been substantially strengthened within the Hangarian Book and some changes made in its paracount to avoid such deviations as may have occurred during the course of the Hangarian Revolution.
- 7. Regarding Recommendation No. 6 of reference, Mr. Delies noted that the organized national councils of the Eastern European emigration were not permitted to exercise control over the policy or the staffing of the RFE program deaks, that individuals for those deaks were blood on the basis of journalistic talent and protected by the American staff or far as possible from the managering of the emigrapolitical factions. In this connection Mr. Delies raised the exaction of previous fixed policy.

agreed that events had evertaken policy in this field, and that the old structure that the Free Europe Committee had been required to undertake should be reviewed jointly by State and GIA. It was felt that this issue should not be submitted to the Special Committee since USIA is not involved.





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- 4. Regarding Recommendation No. 7 of reference, there was agreement that the problem of increased breadcasting to the Asian-African area should be a subject of separate discussion between State, CIA and USIA, rather than being included on the Agenda of the Special Committee.
- 7. Regarding Recommunication to. 8 of reference, there was agreement that effects to reduce dependence on Germany by diversifying breadensting sites should be continued and Mr. Wisner pointed out that Radio Liberation's alternate to secure a base in Spain were motivated by just this consideration.
- 18. Regarding Recommendation No. 9 of reference, Massre. Iderphy and Dulles agreed that there was, at this time, no need for creating a committee of outside consultants to formulate additional recommendations. Rather, it was beyond that the Special Committee to be established would adequately fill this role.
