

March 18, 1957 Views of Ambassador Wailes on Hungarian Situation

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SUBJECT: Debriefing of Ambanesdor Welles and his Deputy, Mr. Meeter

- 1. Generally Mr. Waller' briefing was disappointing as far se ill hopes for Hingary are concerned. Mr. Walles mays that the Soviet Bloc has moved into Bungary with measive and effective accounts aid including 80 to 100 million dollars of Western bard currencies, as well as tone of grain and meat. Hears buying in Subspect has completely consect. Store windows are full emain. Asheasedor Weiles believes that the supplies in Hungary as of today are adequate. The ment supply is the best in posture Bungarian history. The same is true of bread. There are no longer any lines. The stores are full of supplies except for toppage which is still short. Inflation has almost been brought to a balt. In abort, the Soviete realising that the Bingarian secucity had rescited the point of total colleges, moved in with the kind of messive assistance which was required. Ambanuador Welles believes that, contrary to most opinion in the Nest, the situation in Bangary today is more stable than it was last summer prior to the October revelt.
- 2. Other points made by ambassador Valles and Mr. Macher were as follower
 - 1) The Rabmany staff reviewed the coripts of VGA and RFS and concluded that they were consistent with Bi policy. However, the RFS scripts often had a tone which fad the hopes of the poople beyond the point of remitty. Ambanandor Weiler believes, however, that the criticism of the DB radios was greatly overdone.
 - Ambassador Walks does not feel that the HE would be altertion any differently today if there were mather revolution. He speculates that we might have done constituing sees in the UK between the 26th and the 36th of Catobar but is shaptical that even that would have changed the accuracy of events. He doesn't think the revolution could have been held back if the Western radios and diplomats had taken a cautionary, anti-violence position with the Hungarian people.

- 3) Inco Megy was the only possible leader to take the Hungarian people in a direction toward more freedom. Apparender Welles refers to him though, as a man who is not a towar of strength.
- 4) The Seriets are flamating their occupation of Hungary, apparently without much concern for popular reaction. They are rebuilding the destroyed Soviet monuments and publing up red stars and red flags all over the country.
- 5) The Legation sources of information are not very good. Though the staff is free to talk to any average citizen they don't for fear of endangering the life of their contacts. The Legation staff is also affaid of proventions. They had an excellent network of information through the Central Workers' Council but this is no longer possible since the regime has abolished the Council. The ration and Tugoslav embassion which were formerly very good sources have dried up. The British have by far the best information in Hungary. In addition to their trained political reporters they run a press service for all the Western embassion, based on information taken from their translating pool.
- 6) Cardinal Mindocenty is in good chape-very chearful and much stronger than when he came to the Legation. He is still working on his memoires which will be completed some time ment year. The so-called memoires attributed to him published in the West so far have not been authentic according to Ambassador Weiles. Since a November 8 press conference the Cardinal has had no outside visitors except for his mother and a pricet who came to take confession. Ambassador Wailes is convinced that the Cardinal vill nover leave Hungary because he prefers to remain a martyr and stay with his people. He knows that this is his source of political strength.
- 7) The International Rad Cross situation in Hungary is difficult to evaluate. The five directors at the top and most of the people at the working level are Hungarian nationalists who are nore concerned about the plight of the Hungarian people than about communist objectives. However the Endar regime is gradually infiltrating the Red Cross machanism. Ambanandor Welles advised that our sid abould be limited to relief probages and that we should not enter into any bulk aid. Since 950 of the Hungarian people are anti-Soviet and anti-regime, Ambanandor Welles and Mr. Mocker feel that the food packages are getting to people who really need than because they are being widely distributed.

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- 8) There may have been as many as 20,000 people arrested since the revolt. The prisons are reported as over-flowing. It is possible that compulsary labor camps may occas into existence when the warm weather arrives. Since the Legation employees can travel freely throughout Singary the measure of whether labor camps are being set up will be whether travel restrictions are placed again on cartain areas of the company.
- 9) There are still rumore that Inre May may have a public trial. The Endar regime is inspiring black operations such as signs around Budapest saying merely "death to Magy." The Legation has no word about General Maleter.
- 10) The Soviets are hightening up the barriers against leaving Emgary though the fron curtain is not being rebuilt as fast as has been reported in the Western press. One of the major deterrents to escape is a new law providing a five year prison sentence for envlody caught attempting to cross the border.

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
