Jackson and Debevoise called today at their request on Mr. Johnson to discuss the memoranda "The Mission of the Free Europe Committee" and "Free Europe Committee and the Berlin Crisis" which were forwarded by the Free Europe Committee under cover of a letter dated July 3, 1961 to the Secretary.
