IMPACT OF UNCURK'S RECOMMENDATION FOR ITS DISSOLUTION

Dear Mr. Narasimhan,

As you will see in the Concluding Observations of UNCURK's annual report (signed copies of which are presented to you under separate cover), the Commission has irrevocably recommended its dissolution.

One observer has described this deed, (although undertaken in the wake of overpowering external pressure), as an act of "harakiri" which simultaneously "kamikazed" the UN posture and unification principles on Korea.

Instructions to members from the home governments for such recommendation were very unequivocal. Even the practical scultling by Pyongyang of the North-South dialogue two days before the signing of the report, and the absence of a substitute political presence to UNCURK at this most vital juncture, did not prompt the members to seek new instructions. They banked on an exaggerated rationalization of a common point in the Pyongyang and Secul statements paying lip service to the dialogue and expressing hope for its resumption, however almost under prohibitive conditions at least on the part of the DPRK.

Many observers wonder about the impact of the aforesaid "scultling" on the forthcoming Korean debate of the UNGA, and express the hope, perhaps in vain, that the majority may regard a UN political vacuum in Korea as practically inviting untoward or designed armed conflict.
