As far as the arrangements for the phasing out of UNCURK is concerned, Mr. Lansky has said that he will be writing to you shortly giving his views in this regard. In this connexion, we see no objection to your taking some leave en route and reporting for duty early in January. PSCA also has no objection to your taking leave.

As you are aware, negotiations are well underway for the United Nations to disengage itself from its custodial responsibilities in respect of UNICK ofrom next year. Dear Mr. Kittani,

At this phase-out stage of our Secretariat in Seoul, there are, as you are aware, formative political developments which ordinarily would have warranted elucidation and assessment on my part. I refrain from this, as you would agree, since the Principal Secretary's political functions are deemed to have come to an end. In any case, I believe I have in the past extensively reported on current pertinent issues, such as the very formative student movement, North-South tension, growing Korean factionalism, etc., with a rather good "batting average". Naturally, I would be ready for extensive debriefing, inter alia, on these and other burning issues upon my return. It suffices to reiterate with realism that the sudden UN political vacuum here will not at all augur well — hence my continuous stress on previous recommendations.

Administratively, the Secretariat is being phased out with maximum speed and, if the UNDP would be requested to handle procedural and residual affairs, all staff can exit by the year's end.

My own target date is about two weeks, if that is humanly possible and, among other matters, if the situation with respect to the UNMCK Custodianship functions and negotiations thereon become clear. Regarding my departure, I would appreciate if your Office and my Department had no objections against my taking much-needed rest en route so as to arrive at Headquarters around early January. /If I can go through Istanbul, I may be contacted there as follows: TELEGRAPH/MAIL:A.H.H.OZBUDUN, FENERYOLU, SITE APT., BAGDAT CADDESI, 185/204, KIZILTOPRAK, ISTANBUL; TELEPHONE: ISTANBUL 361157/

Dear Mr. Kittani,

Concerning administrative phase-out arrangements and pursuant to my cables on the subject for which no replies have as yet been received, I wish to add the following:

- As soon as I receive your views on our radio station, we will commence dismantling it for dispatch to Pisa and thereupon continue to correspond with you through the UNDP telex in Seoul. The Resident Representative is agreeable to the proposal with appreciation of our fullest cooperation in the past concerning UNDP's cabled correspondence through our station.
- Similarly, we will ask UNDP to take over the pouch functions from us at the earliest opportunity. As you know, heretofore our Secretariat did pouch-servicing for the local UNDP, UNICEF and WHO offices in the ROK.

I have taken the liberty of addressing a similar letter to Mr. Lansky.
