Speech given by Mr. Au Yeung Chuen, Chief of the Mongkong delegation at the opening session of the Asian Youth and Students Anti-Communist Conference on October 15, 1986, Seoul, Morea

Mr. Chairman; Dear Delegation, deaf Friends, Louiss and Gentlemen.

I am very glad to have the honor of representing the Hon, Kone students (and youth) to attend this Asian Youth & Students' Auti-Communist Conforence here today. I wish to take this opportunity to express our many thanks to the Republic of Korea whose hospitality has enabled us to hold this meeting.

This meeting, I have no doubt, has a great meaning to me and to those who are representing the other Asian Youth and Students. Obviously, every youth and student of Asia has the same feeling that this kind of movement is urgently needed.

We have learned, that youth is the pillar of any community and youth is also the motive power of a progressive community. Youth of any nation, in all ages, have played an important role in the influences of the social, economic, political, eductional and cultural systems of their nations. The foliation of a nation is laid by the sacrifice of myriads of youths' blood.

Since the rise Communism in many countries of the world today, the youth within those countries have been in a state of confusion and misery. In those co ntries, the oppressed and enslaved youths under the Communist rule have neither freedom of speech nor freedom of travel— in fact, the word "Freedom" simply means nothing to them. Moreover, no friendship exists; even the primitive relationships between broth rs and sisters, husbands and wives, parents and children, have been abolished withint the Communist ruled countries. There is only tyranny, hatred, suspicional despair and despondency under the Communist rule.

Since the rise of Communism i China, many young Chinese peoppe have fled from the Mainland to Hong Kong. They came to the free world not marely because they chose freedom, but with a sense of responsibility, determined to devote themselves to the destruction of the Communist rule and the establishment of a democratic Government in China.

It is not easy taks. But we are prepared for a painful struggle. We dennot wait for or depend upon "chance". We have confidence and we must take action. At the same time, we know that not merely the strength of the youths of Hong Ko.c. or the youths of worse, or the youths of Victnem, or the yoths of any other Asian country blone can carry out this task. The youths of all free m tions and localities must be united, shoulder to shoulder, to form a collective force in our fight against Communism, overthrow, the Communist aggressors, and to reach our goal of establishing world peace and international cooperation in future.

 W_{r} aim at the present as well as the future; from now on and forever, we must be united to build and serve a F_{r} ee and prosperous Asia.
