VISIT OF U.S. GOVERNORS

SEOUL, May 18 (Eighth Army) --- Four United States governors will visit Korea between May 24 - 29 to observe progress of U.S. and United Nations rehabilitation programs and report their findings to President Eisenhower on their return.

The four governors are Governor Allan Shivers, Texas; Governor Johnston Murray, Oklahoma; Governor Dan Thornton, Colorado; and Governor John Fine, Pennsylvania.

They will be accompanied by Mr. Mark Kramer, Deputy Director of the Council of Governors; Mr. Eugene J. Taylor, Special Assistant to the President of the American-Korean Foundation; and Major General William F. Marquat, Office of the Secretary of Defense.

The party will be met on arrival in Seoul by President Syngman Rhee, Eighth Army Commander General Maxwell D. Taylor, U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Korea Ellis O. Briggs, and U.N. Command Economic Coordinator for Korea C. Tyler Wood.

While in Korea the group will be briefed on the operations of the U.N. Korean Rehabilitation Agency, the Korean Civil Assistance Command and the Armed Forces Assistance to Korea program. The governors will also visit various rehabilitation projects.
