Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

I have received and carefully considered your letter of 26 April 1954.

The Eighth United States Army has directives in force imposing severe penalties on military personnel or civilian employees who engage in black-market or other allied illegal activities in Korea. You will appreciate, I am sure, that such activities are possible only through the active participation of Korean Nationals. Energetic and effective action on the part of the law enforcement agencies of your government in apprehending and punishing personnel of your country in these illegal enterprises will aid immeasurably in this joint effort.

I shall ask my Provost Marshal to approach the Director of the ROK National Police with a view towards intensifying our cooperative effort to halt this illegal traffic.

The use of the APO privileges by persons other than military personnel or non-Korean civilian employees is governed by directives emanating from United States governmental agencies superior to this headquarters. This headquarters will continue to exercise close supervision over the use of this privilege in accord with published directives.
