I would appreciate a decision on the tungsten proposal as soon as it is convenient. After one disappointment I was especially careful in selecting Firth-Sterling. I am sure Mr. Ahn was impressed with the Firth-Sterling's operation and management. This of course is a free enterprise project in which you have always lent encouragement.

Korea has a real job ahead in public relations. Japan is working particularly hard in this field to gain public acceptance. Your Ambassador here is a great builder of good will.

Mrs. Goodfellow joins in sending our best to Mrs. Rhee and you.
