Dear Dr. Rhee:

On April 29th I forwarded a proposal from top tungsten people which I felt sure would interest and benefit Korea. More than two months has elapsed and no concrete or specific word has been received.

In my opinion and in the opinion of those U. S. Government officials we have discussed this plan with it is a workable plan and eminently fair to Korea. You see Korea continues in control at all times under Colonel Mann's plan.

Colonel Mann's group wants to get underway on a beneficiation plant here but it would make a difference in location if Korea is to participate on a basis satisfactory to Korea.

Would I be asking too much to be brought up to date as to whether this project is still of interest and what will be the time element in coming to a decision.

Colonel Mann's daughter was married Saturday and so he is now free to fly to Korea for a conference on the whole subject.
