Dear Mr. Minn,

We write with reference to your letter of March, lith enquiring us as to the legal procedure of deposit in United States Bollar or Pound Sterling which are to be obtained by selling your beer products to the United Nations Armed Forces in Korea.

Under our present foreign exchange regulations, it will be quite in order for your company to accept payment in these currencies if such currencies are subsequently deposited to the Special Foreign Exchange Account with our bank.

However, you are cordially requested to make arrangements with United Nations authorities concerned in connection with the check or payment order to be received against sale of beer to pur a mark on them such as "Not Transferable" or "Payable to the Bank of Korea for Account of Chosun Brewery Co. Ltd." This suggestion is to insure that no such dollar payment will fall into unauthorized persons.

We shall be glad to give you any comments on this matter, if further desired.
