Dear Mr. Ministor:

The Budget Commission approved outlays of the Foreign Affairs Department for six proposed diplomatic and consular establishments in the fiscal year July 1957 - June 30, 1958. The proposed new posts are in Burma, Ceylon, Egypt and three other places in Europe. The foreign affairs requested for more funds to carry on the rotation of foreign service personnel whose maximum tour of duty is four years. The Department of Foreign Affairs requested the President to increase the 1957 appropriation to 12 million pesos which would almost double the present expenditure. Main item of the budget increase is the additional sompensation for the foreign service personnel living abroad.

I received a communication from Mr. Soon Yong Lee, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Secul Country Club, stating that two professional golf players and amateur golfers will come here to participate in the international open golf championship tournament which will be held in the early part of January next year. Mr. Walter S. Robertson, Assistant Secretary of State with his wife and two assistants arrived here on December 13, and stayed overnight.

At breakfast the following morning, Robertson assured the President that 20 million dollar atoms-for-peace project will soon be started in Hanila. In regard to the irritant military bases controversy, Hagsaysay said that a long fixed term of 99 year lease for the military bases is impractical, and he reiterated his stand in favor of rotaining the U.S. bases in the Philippines as long as they are demanded through mutual security reasons. I met the Robertson party at the Hanila International Airport. Your cable reminder of Robertson's visit to Hanila and Securi is appreciated.

At the request of Minister Cosme P. Garcia, the Philippine Armed Forces designated Major Mario Kimseng, a Korean war veteran as military attache to the Philippine Legation in Secul. He and his wife with three children will be going to Secul soon. During the visit of General II Kwon Guung, Vice Consul Chung escorted the general as military attache of the Korean Legation here.

Christmas cheer packages will be distributed next week to seventy five Filipino veterans of the Korean war now convalescing at the V. Luna Army Hospital. This is the third year the Filipino veterans of the Korean war will be visited with Christmas cheer and goodwill from the people of Korea. The packages contain eignrettes, candies and cookies.

At my suggestion, General Chung visited the veterans of the Korean war at the V. Luna Army Hospital, and they all appreciated the general's kind gesture in remembering them. There are about six thousand officers and men of five batatalion combat teams who fought in the Korean war from 1950 to 1954.
