Soviet film director Mikhail Kalatozov has departed from the United States but is expected to return in 1945. Final report on his activities and contacts prior to departure.

BORIS MORROS and KALATOZOV entered into an agreement for the sale of motion picture "Tales of Manhattan" and for the distribution of certain usable works produced in the USSR. Investigation continuing regarding the relationship between RKO and Soyuzintorgkino for the exchange of motion pictures between the United States and Soviet Russia. b7C	On October 14, 1944 contacted the KALATOZOVS; however, neither was available and the advised that she would call back later. again contacted the KALATOZOVS and advised them that they were expected for dinner at the MORROS home that evening.
b7D	On October 16, 1944 KAIATOZOV received a Western Union telegram from Warner Brothers New York office which stated: "SHIPPING YOU TODAY PRINT OF MIDSUMMER NIGHTS DREAM /s
1	On this same dateinvited who is under investigation in connection with another case, to her home.
	On October 17, 1944 CHARLES CHAPLIN, well known motion picture actor, contacted and invited KAIATOZOV, at Los Angeles, to dinner on October 18, 1944.
	on October 20, 1944 an unknown woman contacted and desired to know whether KALATOZOV was going to dinner which was to be held on October 21, 1944.
	by long distance telephone at MI. 9138, Washington, D. C. Their conversation was in Russian, a translation of which has not been made to date. On this same date an unknown man contacted KALATOZOV and asked him whether he had a copy of the motion picture "Tales of Manhattan". KALATOZOV advised he did not have a copy and that the man should get in touch with BORIS MORROS. On this date an individual known as contacted and asked if she had received the letter. She stated that she did not know where the theater would be, apparently making reference to resuming of her career She stated that it would be first in Moscow, then in Leningrad. Reference was then made to what KALATOZOV should do in case of inspection, apparently referring to his clearing of certain documents through Gustoms.

	and advised her that the KALATOZOVS were so rushed they could not go over to get the pictures. KALATOZOV wanted a picture of CHAPLIN and was advised that would leave them at the studio for KALATOZOV to pick up.
b7C	With regard to KALATOZOV'S activities up until the time he left the United States, the following was ascertained through physical surveillance.
b7D	On the night of October 14, 1944 a farewell reception was held for him at the Russian Vice Consulate. and of the Soviet Vice Consulate, San Francisco, attended this reception. There were at least one hundred persons in attendance including such individuals as CHARLES CHAPLIN, BORIS MORROS, HANNS FISLER, BERT MECHT and many others prominent in Hollywood who have been associated with either "left wing" or Communist movements.
b2	Fromit was ascertained that he had reviewed several prints of American films which KALATOZOV intended to take with him to Russia on his departurestated that KALATOZOV had the following prints:

	On October 21. 19hh Special Agent accompanied Customs Inspector and United States Censorship representative, to the home of MIKHAIL KALATOZOV, 17hh Los Feliz Boulevard, for the purpose of searching and sealing KALATOZOV'S luggage and household effects. Agent attended under the pretext of being a Censorship representative.

LA 100-19404 KALATOZOV, were present. A total of twenty two boxes and trunks were examined, which contained mostly clothing and canned food. One box contained a paint supply and cosmetic outfit while another contained a new inter-office communication system. KALATOZOV had several boxes of books many of which were concerned with art. There were a few Russian books, but mone of them appeared to be of interest to the Bureau. There were two copies of The Writers' Congress book written following the Writers' Congress held in October 1943 in Los Angeles. There was also an autographed copy of a book by LION-FEUCHTWANCER, a subject in the Comrap investigation, an autographed copy of "The Last Mile" by JOHN WEALEY, and many other books by Communist writers. b7C KALATOZOV also presented for inspection two small packages of clothing which he stated "are not mine" remarking that they were gifts he was taking to Russia from people in the United States. Both of these packages contained notes written in Russian. One was from and the other was from These two notes are being translated by the Office of Censorship. Also noted were approximately twenty five phonograph records, most of which were of the standard commercial type of popular songs; however, one album was entitled "Songs for Democracy" concerning the International Brigade in Spain and contained the following handwritten message by PAUL MOBESON, Negro Communist singer: "These songs of the Spanish struggle deeply reflect the democratic spirit. That spirit of Joe Hill never died. This album is a 'must'." There were also many photographs among KALATOZOV'S effects. almost entirely of the studio type. 8 x 10 inches in size. of KALATOZOV SAMUEL GOLDWYN. taken with and an unknown man CHARLES CHAPLIN. identified as a member of the Soviet Government Purchasing Commission. Many of these pictures were taken at the reception held in August 1943 for KAIA-TOZOV at the Mocambo night club in Hollywood. b7C ascertained In conversation with KAIATOZOV, Agent that he was returning to Moscow and would leave on October 25, 1944 aboard a Russian tanker from Long Beach. KALATOZOV did not know the name of this tanker. He stated he is returning to motion picture work in the Soviet Union, and remarked that he is a director. It was noted that KAIATOZOV had a poor understanding of English and would respond only to simple

questions, usually asking

b7C	I am Sending you a picture of On November 6. 1914 in company with Of the United States Customs. Inspectors Special Agent noted the contents of two large wooden boxes which were being taken aboard the SS "Taganrog" by MIKHAIL KALATOZOV. The boxes were consigned to "Moscow Kino Komitet". One box was noted to contain \$800.00 worth of theatrical cosmetics. The other box contained various articles among which was a Victrola, considerable blank paper, and a picture of CHARLES CHAPLIN. The picture was autographed to with love". United States Customs officials advised on November 11, 1944 that MIKHAIL KALATOZOV, had departed on that date from San Pedro at 1:15 P. M. aboard the SS "Taganrog" bound for Vladivostok.
	It was ascertained at the time of KALATOZOV'S departure who returned from New York with KALATOZOV and who is in this country for the purpose of the Russian motion picture industry, did not depart with and is remaining in Los Angeles. presently residing
	Regarding KALATOZOV'S successor it is apparent that his activities will be carried on by assigned to Los Angeles.
	On November 12, 13, and 14, 1944 a confidential source advised that a thorough search of the KALATOZOV residence failed to produce anything of interest in the way of trash, scrap paper or other articles which they had left behind.
b2 b7D	On November 29, 1944 advised that he had received information that KALATOZOV would return to this country in February or March, 1945 and would again resume his duties as official representative of the Soviet motion pictures.

Referenced report set out a lead to ascertain the nature of the contract between RKO and Soyuzintorgkino, Soviet motion picture combine. To date no information has been obtained regarding this contract; however investigation is continuing and will be reported in this case.


