#### State Department Office of Policy Coordination Memorandum, 'Considerations in Choosing the Members and Executive Secretary for the Cinderella Cover Committee' [Declassified September 19, 2016]

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## Summary:

An OPC official, drawing negative lessons from Free Europe Committee autonomy, argues that AMCOMLIB (cryptonym Cinderella) should be a pure front and not be allowed the autonomy gained by the FEC.

SUBJECT: Considerations in Choosing the Members and Executive Secretary for the Ginderella Sever Committee

1. The most vital element in the over-all project Cinderella is the Executive Secretary of the American sover consister. Upon his ability and his relationship with 070 will depend in large part the success of the operation. The experience gained in establishing and operating the NOFE has clearly demonstrated the importance of this individual. So is either the keystone which successfully binds whole operations together or he is a battleneck and point of frigiton.

2. An analysis of the history of the HOFE shows that its Executive Secretary's cominationsmous position as the representative of a semi-autonomous committee is one of the basis difficulties in the whole project and the cause of a great number of our worst headaghes. OPG has not had adequate control of this key figure; such control is an absolute essential from an operational standpoint. In Ginderells there must be no question of whom he is working for. He must get his orders from OPG and his policy guidance from State through OPG.

3. The semi-autonomene cover committee is the other major difficulty connected with the NGFR which we wish to avoid this time. The NOFE is composed of a group of active, aggressive and ambitious individuals who insist on playing a much bigger role in the activities of the NOFE than was intended and who regard themcelves as cant-antonomous from OFG. As a result the NOFE has unnecessarily had its already difficult activities complicated by its manhers' politics, struggle for influence, and interference with operational problems. We do not wish this to by happen with the American cover committee for Sinderells which should be soluly a front mechanism.

5. To avoid having a too aptive conmittee, we believe it would be wise to select individuals not would be willing to not as a front but who would not try to do more than was asked of them. They should be distinguished, able but not particularly ambitious. Older man cuch as Charles Seymour and Senry Glean Orifle, who have retired after distinguished carears, would seem in be should the right type. Such man would ably perform any duties artigned them, but would not attempt to carry the ball on their own. They are a
